

St. Mary's Academy has a new President



"We have an energetic new President in the wings. Connie Yunyk (Scerbo '77) is an experienced educator and leader who brings energy and enthusiasm to the tasks before her. She is tireless in her efforts to help our young women reach their full potential and passionate about the future of St. Mary's Academy." These are the parting words of Sister Susan Wikeem as the torch of leadership was passed to Mrs. Connie Yunyk in August 2014. This marks the first time in the Academy's 145 year history that the transition has been made to lay leadership.

Long history with the Academy

Connie's association with the Academy and the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary began in 1971 when she entered grade 7. This super-sixer will be remembered by the Class of 1977 as an out-going, enthusiastic classmate and active member of the Athletic Club.

In 1981 Connie attended the University of Winnipeg obtaining a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in French Language and Literature. After a period of time at home raising her children she continued her

education at the University of Manitoba, obtaining a Bachelor of Education and a Post Baccalaureate Certification in Education, with emphasis on Educational Administration. She also holds Level 1 and Level 2 School Administration Certificates.

Connie taught in a French Immersion setting in the public school system for ten years before joining the Academy's staff in 1998. In 2002 she was appointed Vice Principal and in 2005 she became Principal.

Committed to faith based education

Committed to education of young women within a Catholic faith community, she completed the two year Certificate in Religious Education at St. Paul's College and the three year Nathanael Ministries Formation Program offered by the Archdiocese of Winnipeg. Also, Connie is an *Associate of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary*. Associates are people who share the spirituality, mission and charisma of Mother Marie Rose and become formally affiliated with the Sisters.

Connie and her husband Jim have two children, Johnathan, a graduate of St. Paul's High School (2003) and Larissa, a

graduate of the Academy (2008).

Connie responded to her appointment as follows: "I am deeply humbled and honored by this opportunity to lead SMA as President at this critical time in our history. I am forever grateful to the members of the Search Committee for their unwavering commitment and professionalism to the process; to the Board; SNJM, for placing their trust in me and to Sister Susan Wikeem for her guidance, advice and support personally and professionally over the years. I embark on this next chapter of my SMA story with enthusiasm, conviction and commitment, and look forward to working with this amazing school community to keep the flame burning bright!"

Faith & Community involvement

Connie has been a life-long parishioner of Holy Rosary Parish and has volunteered in many capacities over the years. Currently she is on the Parish Liturgical committee and is lector for both Italian and English masses.

Connie is also dedicated to the Italian community and is currently President of the Italian Canadian Centre Board of Directors.

The tradition continues

Although the day-to-day operations have been passed on to a lay administrator, the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary remain at the helm of the Academy providing direction and service as owners, members of Boards and committees, volunteers and class prayer partners. Significantly, the Sisters establish the mission and purpose of the Academy, approve By-Laws, elect the Directors, appoint the President, and approve certain financial decisions.

In addition to the Sisters involvements at the Academy, there are also Associates of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary on staff.

Honouring SNJM's Foundress

The week of October 6th is Mother Marie Rose Durocher Week at the Academy. During this week staff and students learn more about the foundress of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary and what inspired her life and actions. Her favorite scripture text from the Gospel of Luke was "I have come to cast fire upon the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled." She believed that education, grounded in faith and centered in justice, could transform the minds and hearts of young women, and that the women, in turn, could transform an entire society. Today this vision continues to inspire members of the SMA community. Faculty and staff fan the sparks and embers into flames confident that our graduates will Hold High the Torch and become the firebuilders of tomorrow.

A network of schools

St. Mary's Academy is one of seven schools in North America sponsored by the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary. These SNJM Network Schools, individually and collaboratively, continue the founding spirit of the sisters and their foundress, Mother Marie Rose Durocher. Every year in March administrators from the anglophone schools meet to discuss common issues and initiatives. One initiative we undertook last year was to encourage each of our schools to adopt a Holy Names school in a third world country to lend support to that school. Our adopted school is Holy Names High School in Bela Bela, Lesotho, Africa.


Math Inquiry Symposium

2014 Marian Award Recipients



Leanne Boyd ('69)

Leanne holds RSW & MSW degrees along with an Advanced Certificate - Community Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, she has worked for the Government of Manitoba for the last 38 years. She is Director, Policy Development, Research and Evaluation, Healthy Child Manitoba which bridges community and Manitoba's Healthy Child Committee of Cabinet, the only legislated Cabinet Committee in Canada dedicated to the health and well-being of children and youth.

Sr. Lesley Sacouman ('63), friend and mentor for many decades, introduced Leanne. They first met when Leanne was in grade 11 at SMA and was a member of the Legion of Mary. One activity was to walk down Main Street where they would meet people in their dignity and humanity. After talking with the people, they soon realized that food was available for them on weekdays but not on Sundays so they decided they would buy food, make sandwiches and serve them on Sunday's at Immaculate Conception Parish. This small mustard seed has become the Sunday Drop-in, an inner city cornerstone, which still operates today.

"So, then, what are the building blocks we received from SMA—our foundational values, some learned at home and many learned and/or embraced to be our own in high school? We know a lot more now, than we did when I was in high school, about the adolescent brain—under construction until age 25 or so – and the impact of high school on academic and socio-emotional learning. Research has provided us with incontrovertible evidence on the critical importance of learning in a safe environment, an environment of faith and hope, and its scaffolding effect on future life outcomes. As alumnae of SMA, we are responsible for speaking Truth to Power. We are responsible for "holding high the torch" and for transforming the vision of Blessed Marie Rose through our lives. I chose to transform that vision through a career in government. I chose to dedicate my 40 years in government to improving the mental health of children, youth, their families and communities. I believe our emotional and spiritual well-being is the essence of life at the individual and population level. There is an epidemic of children, youth and young adults with mental health problems in our schools and communities. Every person in this room could help to stop this epidemic—could personally connect with a child, youth, young adult and see their strengths—to be the difference that will enable them to learn, and to live their lives in a safe, happy and fulfilling way. This is my vision that I carry with me—every day—from my years at St. Mary Academy." *Leanne Boyd*



Kellie O'Rourke ('76)

Kellie is a Registered Nurse with 35 years experience in healthcare, currently Chief Operating Officer of Winnipeg West Integrated Health & Social Services. Her portfolio includes Grace Hospital, Winnipeg West ACCESS Centre and Community Health Services for St. James Assiniboia and Assiniboine South, a unique new health care delivery model within the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority. In this capacity, Kellie oversees a staff of 2500 and \$150M budget.

Colleen O'Rourke ('69) declared her sister to be a woman of great character and accomplishment including her educational achievements of BN in Nursing and her Masters degree of Science in Administration. While serving as Executive Director of Support Services at St. Boniface, she was responsible for capital projects including the \$16M Bergen Cardiac Centre, the \$13M "Atrium" and the Buhler Gallery, the first hospital art gallery in Manitoba. Kellie's volunteer history is extensive, always embracing the importance of providing service to both her community and her profession with a thirst for knowledge and a commitment to patient care and wellness.

"A key lesson I learned at St. Mary's is the importance of human connection. As a young ICU nurse I cared for the some of the first AIDS patients in Manitoba. In the early days of the epidemic there was enormous fear and a lack of information about transmission and healthcare providers went to extremes to protect themselves. We were doing the best we could with the information we had. After working a long stretch of seven 12 hour shifts to care for one man in isolation, I spontaneously took my protective gloves off and touched him on his shoulder to comfort him after removing a breathing tube. He then told me of his sense of extreme isolation due to the lack of eye contact and human touch and how much this small touch meant to him as one human being to another during such a terrifying time in his life. I've never forgotten that patient and what he taught me. Throughout all the roles in my career, I have kept that lesson in the forefront. Today as Chief Operating Officer of Winnipeg West Integrated Health & Social Services I have such an incredible opportunity to help create an environment and support a culture where people can do their best work and be truly present for those who come to us for care or services. During our monthly orientation for new staff & physicians one of the key messages I give is that: "People don't always remember what we did or didn't do for them but they *always, always* remember how we made them feel." *Kellie O'Rourke*





They took part in presentations given at different public events about the Warming Huts, including the WAG's 10x20x20 and a special presentation given by the University. The project itself was featured in the Wpg Free Press, Wpg Sun, The CBC and international design blogs like ArchDaily.

Sr. Lesley Sacouman has been an inspiration to others for four decades. To her credits, she co-founded Rossbrook House, an inner-city drop-in shelter, in the mid-70's followed closely by founding an alternative junior high school program held at Rossbrook House. In 1998, she founded Esther House, a second stage home for women in addictions recovery. In 2002, after a year spent living in a New York City shelter she returned with a vision for a transitional shelter for women from different countries, circumstances and faiths. To meet this need, she opened Holy Names House of Peace in 2004 and in 2010 the facility was expanded. In July 2013 she helped launch Marie Rose Place which will offer furnished apartments for newcomer, single women and their children, set to open in October 2014.

Sr. Lesley is the Executive Director of Holy Names House of Peace and is a member of The Winnipeg Foundation board.

The Academy's Bursary Program

The mission of the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary is education with "special concern for the poor and disadvantaged." As a Catholic school in the tradition of the Sisters, the Academy echoes this concern with its own mission statement which mandates promotion of justice, education of social responsibility and financial accessibility. The Academy promotes the dignity of each person and challenges each member of the school community to act justly. It follows then, that it is integral to the ethos of the Academy to recruit and retain students from a wide range of socio-economic conditions and provide financial assistance to deserving students.

In order to ensure that the mission of the Sisters and the Academy would continue to be carried out the *Bursary Fund* was established from financial contributions of groups and individuals, to provide financial aid to those students whose parents demonstrate financial need.

A specific and segregated pool of capital which is utilized in assisting students attending the Academy through the reduction of tuition fees, the *Fund* is held by the St. Mary's Academy Foundation Inc. The

Foundation is a public foundation registered as a charity under the Income Tax Act.

St. Mary's Academy Bursary Fund

The *Bursary Fund* plays an important role in maintaining the diversity of the school. Aside from benefiting the students who receive bursaries, the entire school benefits from their contribution and from the cosmopolitan and heterogeneous make-up of the student body.

Since June 1974 when the bursary program was formalized the Academy 2,843 financial awards have been disbursed totalling \$3,520,619. Within the Fund are several unrestricted bursaries, as well as bursaries in the names of individuals or groups who gifted the capital by way of bequests or other gifts, for unrestricted applications as well as gifts with restrictive conditions.

Funds in the spotlight:

Austin Moffatt Barkwell Bursary Fund

Mr. Barkwell was at the helm of Barkwell Paper Company until 1958. His wife Harriet (nee Harrington) attended St. Mary's Academy in 1903 and his daughters attended the Academy during the late 1930's and early 1940's. The fund was established by Beatrice E. Connell (Barkwell '36) in memory of her father.

Gabrielle Roy Bursary Fund

Manitoba author Gabrielle Roy's work has left an enduring mark on the cultural life of her country. She was educated by the Sisters of the Holy Names at St. Joseph's Academy and one of her sisters was a member of the Order, Sister Leon de la Croix. Another of Gabrielle's sisters, Clemence, was cared for by the Sisters of the Holy names, specifically Gabrielle's friend Sister Berthe Valcourt who currently resides at Residence Despins. Upon the death of Clemence, Sister Berthe arranged for the establishment of the Gabrielle Roy Bursary Fund.

The Fund is open to receive donations at any time and may be an appropriate vehicle to receive gifts from book clubs, or simply friends and alumnae who recognize the tradition of women contributing to the arts.

Onie Clubb Bursary Fund

This bursary was established in 2003 in memory of Onie Clubb (Leyden '28), a loyal alumna of St. Mary's Academy, by Mrs. Clubb's daughters Barbara Clubb '65, Patricia Clubb '66, Susan Clubb '71 and Carole Clubb '75. While the primary donors to the fund are family members, the fund is open to donations from others.

The generosity and loyalty of the Clubb family assists in keeping the Academy accessible to deserving students.

The Sister Susan Wikeem Bursary

Established in 1985, this bursary continues to provide financial assistance to deserving students through the reduction of tuition fees. *Please note, it is Sister Susan's wish that in lieu of gifts for her retirement in 2014, donations be made to the bursary to ensure St. Mary's Academy remains accessible to all qualified students regardless of their economic circumstances.*

How the Bursary Fund is applied

Bursaries are awarded on the basis of:

- The financial need of the family.
 - The number of students requesting a bursary.
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- Bursaries are not granted to cover the full cost of tuition. A financial commitment is required by the applicant's family.


